



A LEGACY OF FLIGHT GANDER AIRPORT

During the 1930s, aircraft were quickly advancing in design, capacity and range. It was becoming clear that passenger-carrying aircraft would soon be developed that could make the North Atlantic journey. Britain made the decision to locate a suitable site for an airport in Newfoundland. At the time, the plan was considered to be "the biggest gamble ever taken in aviation history" - Building an airport in the wilderness in what was essentially a rural economy to promote

trans-Atlantic air travel that did not yet exist for land-based aircraft that did not yet exist.

In June of 1936, workers spilled off the train at Milepost 213 on the Newfoundland Railway. Still incredulous at the task they had been assigned, they set about clearing land for what would become the world's largest airport, boasting one square mile of tarmac. Known as the Newfoundland Airport at the



time, it was a result of a 1935 agreement between Canada, the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and Ireland, to establish commercial and military air service across the North Atlantic.

On January 11, 1938, Captain Douglas Fraser flew a



single-engine biplane to the first landing at the newly completed airport. With the threat of war in Europe, Gander became a strategic post for the Royal Air Force Ferry Command in 1940. Too new (and top secret) to appear on maps, the air base remained shrouded in secrecy as some 20,000 North American-built fighters and heavy bombers were transported overseas. As many as 12,000 British, Canadian and American servicemen lived in crowded barracks beside and between the runways.

After the war, the airport reverted to civilian control and efforts began to move residents a safer distance from the runways. Construction began in the 1950s on the present townsite. The municipality was incorporated in 1958 and the airport settlement was eventually abandoned. The vast resources of a world at war had conquered the problems of transatlantic flight and Gander stepped back into its original role as a global hub of civil aviation.

Throughout the 'Jet Age' of the '50s and '60s, virtually every transatlantic flight required a refueling stop at Gander. The terminal became a rest stop for the rich and famous, from the Hollywood Who's Who to kings and presidents, and 'star-gazing' was



a popular local pastime. While the 'Cold War' drew hard lines between easternbloc and western nations, Gander remained a safe haven for all, one of the few places where American spy planes might share the ramp with Soviet jetliners. In restaurants and shopping malls, Russian or Cuban voices scarcely raised an eyebrow among residents long accustomed to welcoming the world.



Since its inception, Gander International Airport has remained at the forefront of international aviation technology. During the war years, the Allies used direction-finding equipment to locate the dreaded battleship Bismarck; in the '70s it hosted the first transatlantic test flights of the SST Concorde;

Gander served as an alternate landing site throughout NASA's Space Shuttle program; and today nearby NAV Canada's Area Control Centre manages a massive area from just east of Montreal to "30 west" (half way across the North Atlantic). About 1,500 high level aircraft (over 30,000 ft) come through our airspace in an average day, not including local air traffic.

TOWN OF GANDER CROSSROADS OF THE WORLD

The community of Gander originally developed beside and between the Airport runways in the late 1930s. In 1950, Gander still existed in these airport sectors. There were 3 taxi companies, 2 movie theatres, 2 fire halls, 3 grocery stores, a bakery, a laundry, a jeweler, a photographic studio and more, for about 3,000 people.

However, Airport management declared there could be no further growth in the community, as space was at a premium. A new townsite was selected and a town plan with street layout was initiated (along with the now famous Gander's head hidden in the shape of the streets).

When the first houses were



built in Gander in 1952, the cost of a residential lot was \$50 plus services. By the end of 1957, the new town of Gander contained 685 houses, 22 businesses (including 4 department stores), two schools, a convent and five churches under construction. On December 16th 1958, our status changed from a Local Service District to the Town of Gander, with the first Council being sworn in on January 23rd 1959.



Growth continued throughout the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s. Though the airport's global presence was reduced somewhat by the introduction of globe-circling passenger jets, the town became integral as the service centre for the Kittiwake Coast. New services and businesses, particularly shopping, along with the College system, enticed people to move to Gander to raise their families. Today, the Town of Gander continues to rise to new challenges, as the regional service centre for some 80,000 people in more than 100 neighbouring communities. Both aviation and Gander International Airport remain strong players in the area's economy, with the retail, education, health care and tourism sectors playing prominent roles in our growing town of more than 13,000 residents.



POPULATION CHANGES

In 1957, Gander's population was about 3,500 people. In 1965, there were about 6,500 residents. 1975 - about 8,500 residents. 2005 - about 9,900 residents. In 2022, there were approximately 13,200 residents, which is huge growth in the past few years.

GANDER BUCKET LIST

Visit the terminal at Gander International Airport on James Blvd and head to the Observation Area to see flights coming and going. Marvel at the International Lounge,



one of the most important Modernist rooms in Canada with furniture and themes from 1959, the inspirational "Birds of Welcome" sculpture by Art Price, and Kenneth Lochhead's famous 22 m (72 ft) artwork "Flight and Its Allegories". Enjoy the new historical exhibit in the Lounge that features key exciting moments of Gander's history. See a piece of World Trade Centre steel up close.



Walk around the 4 km boardwalk at Cobb's Pond

Rotary Park, take a minute at one of the viewing areas, and enjoy the fresh air and scenery this lovely park has to offer. Familyoriented, playground, picnicking, summer concerts, washrooms, wheelchair accessible.

Walk Gander's original 1930s-1950s townsite in the former airport sectors, revitalized today as Gander Heritage Trails. This light walking trail takes you back in time on WWII Gander streets, where storyboards tell the tales of the

place that was home to more than 3,000 people who serviced the airport. Located off Circular Road, north of the runways. For directions, photos and history, search Gander Heritage Trails on Facebook.

Throw some rocks as you curl at the Gander Curling Club, 146 Airport Blvd. Call 709-256-7676 for information.

Tee off and play golf at the Gander Golf Club. Located on the Trans Canada Highway in Gander, this 18 hole golf course has a beautiful clubhouse and rentals are available. Call 709-256-3931 for details.



Take in a concert or a play performed by local or national acts in the 400-seat theatre at the Joseph R Smallwood Arts & Culture Centre, swim laps in the 25 m (82 ft) pool, or view some of the many exhibitions in the art gallery. Located at 155 Airport Blvd. Call 709-256-1081 for theatre information or 709-256-1062 for pool information.



On the corner of Lindbergh Road and

Airport Blvd, Heritage

Memorial Park is a place of quiet contemplation. Visitors can view and read the 125 (NL) Squadron R.A.F. Memorial and the War Monument, which reflect the military history of Gander. Especially poignant is the life-sized monument of the heroic life-saving Newfoundland dog Sgt. Gander and his wartime handler.



Take in a play or musical performed by Beyond The Overpass Theatre Company, Gander's youth performers. Call 709-256-7529 or http://www.beyondtheoverpass.ca/ for showtimes/locations.

Take a walk through the woods, birdwatch, or learn about our natural environment at the **Thomas Howe Demonstration Forest**. Located on the Trans Canada Highway just 1 km east from the Cooper Blvd/TCH intersection.

Get into a racquet at the Gander Tennis Courts, corner of Elizabeth Drive and Memorial Drive.

The kids will love the fun Playground and Splashpad (seasonal) at the corner of Elizabeth Drive and Memorial Drive, along with a skateboard park and softball fields. Washrooms on site.

Hike, bike, cross country ski and snowmobile Cobb's Corridor. Part of the Newfoundland T'Railway, this former railbed connects the communities of Gander, Glenwood, Appleton and Benton. Several entrance points are located in the Town of Gander (see the Town map in the



centre of this booklet). A detailed information signboard is located at the intersection of the T'Rail and Airport Blvd.

Perhaps Rover needs a break too! Canines and their humans can stretch and socialize at the Gander Dog Park, located at





the parking lot for

Cobb's Pond Rotary Park (Magee Rd). For details, see the Facebook page Paws Up For Dogs, The Gander Dog Park.

Catch up on your reading at the Gander Public Library, 6 Bell Place. Call 709-651-5354 for opening hours.

Our **Come From Away interpretive panels** provide details and first-hand accounts of the events that took place in Gander during 9/11. Panels are at key locations around Gander mentioned in the smash musical Come From Away. Each panel has a description of the role that particular site

played during 9/11, giving you a uniquely immersive experience while reading about the events that took place at each location. A location map is available at the Town Hall (100 Elizabeth Dr) or by contacting bwilliams@gandercanada.com .

Bowl a strike at Andy's Alleys bowling lanes, corner of Fraser Road and Airport Blvd. For times or more information, call 709-651-2695 or check out http://andysalleys.com/.

Launch your boat at Little Harbour Marina and set sail on 56 km (35 mi) Gander Lake. Public slipway. Located 7.6 km (4.5 mi) west of Gander on the TCH, via a 1.5 km (1 mi) dirt road.

On a sunny day, take a stroll through the streets of Gander. You'll notice that nearly all are named for famous aviators such as Earhart (Amelia), Lindberg (Charles), Garneau (Marc) and Cooper (Royal, one of Newfoundland's own distinguished WWII RAF fighter pilots). And maybe you will notice the outline of a Gander's head formed by Elizabeth Drive, Memorial Drive and Edinburgh Avenue.







And of course, take in Gander's premiere summertime event - the Festival of Flight! For more than 30 years, the Festival has been the family must-attend event of the summer. Many activities take place over the course of several days, ending with a bang on Gander Day which is held the first Monday each August. You can expect lots of exciting and fun activities throughout the Festival, including the delightful Food, Art and Crafter's Market, a smashing good time at the Demolition Derby, soft and refreshing sounds at the Gospel Concert, the upbeat MusicFest, the imaginative floats of the Festival Parade, the hearty Community Breakfast, Newfoundland's Largest Fireworks Display and Newfoundland's Biggest Kitchen Party. World Trade Centre Steel locations in Gander

- On the front lawn of the Town Hall (100 Elizabeth drive), the Compassion Monument is composed of a steel beam from the New York Twin Towers that was gifted to the Town of Gander on September 11th 2011, and a huge chunk of granite from a local NL quarry. Inside the Town Hall, look through several albums full of letters, cards and children's drawings sent as Thank You's to the residents of Gander in the years since 9/11.
- The terminal at Gander International Airport (James Blvd) is home to a piece of WTC steel. It is publicly accessible and is part of a large historical exhibit.
- The North Atlantic Aviation Museum (135 Trans-Canada Highway) has a display dedicated to Gander's 9/11 events, with a piece of WTC steel as its centerpiece.

SEPTEMBER 11, 2001 AND 9/12

On September 11 2001, known the world over as 9/11, North American airspace was closed to all commercial fights due to the terrorist incidents in the US. As a result, 255 passenger aircraft were diverted to 17 Canadian airports; of these, 34 came to Gander with about 6,600 passengers and crew. In addition, four military flights were also diverted, for a total of 38 aircraft. Passengers came from 95 countries, with differing cultures, dietary and religious needs, and customs.

The period of local response that followed 9/11 has become known as 9/12. All passengers were deplaned but all checked baggage had to be left onboard the aircraft. The passengers were only allowed to take their carry-on baggage. In addition to needing food, nutrition and shelter, many passengers also required clothing as well as medications and baby needs. The towns of Gander, Gambo, Glenwood, Appleton, Norris Arm and Lewisporte stepped up to the task and fulfilled all these needs. Passengers were provided shelter in schools, churches, halls and private residences. Over the course of 5 days, local groups and residents tended to the needs of about 6,600 anxious people, often working around the clock to do so. In addition, entertainment was provided, including boat rides, hikes, parties, BBQs and of course, Screech-Ins. Kosher and vegetarian meals were required and prepared, a place was arranged for Muslim and Jewish passengers to pray, and even 17 dogs/cats and 2 Bonobo chimpanzees were given care by the SPCA. Locals did their best to ensure the "Plane People" had everything they needed.

As the last of the aircraft flew out of Gander on September 16th, Gander and the nearby towns started to return to normal. Schools reopened, people went back to their daily routines, and Gander seemed a bit empty. New friendships had been forged, and many would keep in contact even to this day.

In 2001, Gander's population was 9,651. Adding 6,600 passengers meant a population increase of nearly 70% in just a few hours.





THE HIT BROADWAY MUSICAL COME FROM AWAY


In the years since 2001, Gander received hundreds of Thank You cards, letters and photos from not only the passengers, but also from people who had seen the media coverage, especially American prime time specials. This led to heightened interest in Gander and area on social media, and an increase in visitors. However, the biggest was yet to come.

In 2012, Gander and area's assistance during 9/11 hit the stage at Sheridan College, Ontario. Written by David Hein and Irene Sankoff based on a 2011 visit to Gander, success of the musical Come From Away was immediate, and in 2017, the show


debuted on Broadway to rave reviews. Come From Away became a phenomenon that sold out in New York and Toronto and continues in Buenos Aires, Sweden, Finland and England, along with a travelling North American tour. The success has meant a strong increase in local tourism, along with considerable media coverage and a new global awareness of the hospitality of Newfoundlanders.

SILENT WITNESSES MEMORIAL

The Silent Witnesses Memorial was erected in response to the desires of the many directly affected families of the Arrow Air crash victims in the United States. The Dec. 12, 1985 incident claimed the lives of 248 U.S. Army personnel, returning from peacekeeping duties on Egypt's Sinai Peninsula, and eight civilian flight crew. The Memorial embodies a true sense of community oneness and demonstrates Gander's concern for their sad and tragic loss.



The Memorial depicts an American soldier standing atop a massive rock holding the hands of two civilian children. The boy and girl each hold an olive branch, indicative of the peace-keeping mission of the 101st Airborne Division "Screaming Eagles" on the Sinai Peninsula. Behind them rise three flags: Canadian, American and Newfoundland. As the trio stands, looking to the future, they are surrounded by the trees, hills and rocks of the crash site. These natural surroundings are the "Silent Witnesses" of the precise moment when 256 dreams ended, and are an appropriate and peaceful place of remembering.

The sculpture was designed by Lorne Rostotski of St. John's, NL, Canada, and sculpted by Stephen Shields of Hopkinsville, Kentucky. It is located 4km east of Gander on the TCH, then follow a 1km dirt road south to Gander Lake.

Located just below the Memorial is the Cross of Sacrifice. Crafted from the remains of the emergency door of the ill-fated DC8, the cross bears the inscription "Rendezvous With Destiny" - the motto of the 101st Airborne Division.



The grounds are known as Peacekeeper Park and are maintained by donations of visitors to the site. For details about this tragedy, search Arrow Air Flight 1285 in any browser.

NORTH ATLANTIC AVIATION MUSEUM

The North Atlantic Aviation Museum is located on the Trans Canada Highway overlooking Gander Lake. Through the careful collection,

preservation and display of stories, photographs, documents and artifacts, the Museum chronicles the conquest of the North Atlantic and establishment of air routes linking the old world with the new.

The modern interpretation centre is interactive and hands-on in many respects - view a DC-3 cockpit, examine 50 calibre machine guns up close, take control of the Redbird Jay Velocity Edition flight simulator or stroll among the various historic aircraft parked



around the museum grounds. The Museum is also home to a dedicated 9/11 display which contains a piece of steel from the World Trade Centre.

THE KITTIWAKE COAST

The Kittiwake Coast is your vacation destination in Newfoundland. Named for an oceandwelling gull – intrepid explorers that seldom come to land - the Kittiwake Coast expresses the outport lifestyle for which Newfoundland is famous.

Much of the Coast lies within "Iceberg Alley"; every summer huge masses of ice tickle our shores. Many species of whales come to feed on dense schools of silvery capelin. Meet the people and our culture, largely unchanged since we claimed these rocky shores as our home centuries ago.

The **Trans Canada Highway** provides access to three themed touring routes, with each being a convenient day-trip from Gander:

The **Road to the Isles (Route 340)** takes you on a journey to a number of islands: Fogo Island (one of the four corners of the earth, according to the Flat Earth Society), Change Islands, Exploits Island, New World Island, and the historic fishing community of Twillingate.

The **Road to the Shore (Route 330)** has its gateways in Gander and Gambo, birthplace of our first premier, Joey Smallwood. Known as 'the loop', it features the Barbour Living Heritage Village and many other attractions.

The **Road to the Beaches (Route 310**), where you will find an entrance to Terra Nova National Park, is the route to the Eastport Peninsula and some of the sandiest beaches in the province.

The Kittiwake Coast offers you a wide range of experiences. Hundreds of years of history, with modern amenities, are waiting to be found. Hear our tales over a cup of tea; take a boat tour; or stroll hiking trails for breathtaking vistas. Or maybe just sit a while, and watch the 'bergs drift by.
